PILOT'S LONG WALK FOR P AFTER CRASH

WALCHA, Tuesday. — The pilot of a light aircraft walked nearly two miles in bare feet across mountainous scrub country to get help after his plane had crashed north-east of Walcha late yesterday afternoon.

A Percival plane piloted by Edward Robert Whalan (27), of Cronulla, crashed into the side of a hill on Bywell, the property of Mr. E. J. Fenwicke,

about 12 miles from Walcha.

Allocation For Wheat Research

CANBERRA, Tuesday. -The Federal ment has allocated £266,-000 to State Depart-ments of Agriculture for research into the wheat industry.

N.Z. 'QUAKE

WELLINGTON (New Bea-land), Tuesday. — An earthquake of major intensity has been reported from New reported from Guinea, but little damage has been caused.

Tremors were felt all along the North New Guinea Coast in Wewak and other communities.

The epicentre of the earthouake was reported to be in the Bismarck Sea, some dist-ance from the mainland in the early hours of todays

It is understood the crash occurred as Whaian was re-turning at the end of the day's work at about 5 p.m.

The crash completely crushed the cockpit, jamming Whalan's flying boots on the pedals.

Although suffering lacerated facial injuries, and dislocation of a shoulder, Whalan managed to struggle free of his boots and the cockpit, and set out for help.

He walked nearly two miles in near-freezing temperatures over rough country in the darkness to reach a house occupied by Mr. V. O'Neill, of Day's Mountain, at about 6.45 p.m.-nearly two hours after the crash.

Whalan was taken to Walcha Hospital by Mr. O'Neill's

sons. He was admitted.

A police search party located the plane this morning and stood guard over the wreckage till the arrival of an official from the Department of Civil Aviation.

The pilot of another light aircraft working with the crashed plane, (Mr. K. Ducat, of Tamworth) set out for Walcha at the finish of his run. Whalan remained to complete dropping operations.

The other pilot became concerned when he could not see Whalan's plane and returned to Walcha to give the alarm. However, by this time, Whalan had himself given

the alarm.

Late tonight, Whalan was in a satisfactory condition in Walcha hospital.

The Inspector of Air Safety with the Department of Civil Aviation (Mr. G. Treanor) is investigating.

Whalan. an dropping superphosphate on pilot, came to Tamworth to the property yesterday. join Airfarm Associates several months ago.

2 Railway Workers Die In Collision

CANBERRA, Tue two men were killed and four injured, two seriously, when a diesel shunting engine and a hand-trolley carrying a railway work gang collided near Queanbeyan today.

Dead are William Thompson (about 43). single, of Goulburn, and George Hughes

Goulburn, and George Hughes (40), single, of Cowra.

Two other men, Byron Ashton (35), single, of Wyong, and Frank Walkingshow (40) married, of Narara Via Gos-ford, were admitted to the Queanbeyan Hospital with serious spinal injuries.

Railway authorities had to send a special train and van from Queanbeyan to the scene of the accident to bring out the injured men.

Ambulancemen, who could not bring cars near the scene of the accident, travelled in the van.

Other railway workmen in the area, who heard the crash, used another hand-trolley to go to Queanbeyan for help.

The collision took piace in a deep cutting about two miles north of Queanbeyan. Police and railway author-

ities are conducting an inquiry into the accident.

The trolley was carrying 14 men at the time of the acci-dent. Eight of the men were thrown from the trolley to the side of the track, but suffered only minor injuries.
